#### **Arriving in Singapore**

#### **SG Arrival Card Application**

Kindly note that all travellers are required to submit their <u>SG Arrival Card</u> **before** arriving in Singapore. You can submit your electronic health declaration 3 days prior to your date of arrival in Singapore.

#### **Getting around Singapore\***

#### Public Transportation - Train/Bus

#### Train

Singapore train system is known as the Mass Rapid Transit (MRT). There are six MRT lines each marked with a distinct colour, while stations are assigned numbers for easy identification – <u>see the SMRT Journey Planner for the latest updates</u>. Station signage and announcements are in the four official languages: English, Chinese, Malay and Tamil.

#### Bus

<u>Singapore's bus network</u> is extensive and covers most of the island, with frequencies typically from 10–20 minutes. Bus stops have a unique ID number to help you identify where to stop, and most bus stops will have some route information at the bus stop itself. Google Maps is fairly accurate when planning a bus route; other apps you can use include <u>Citymapper</u> and MyTransport.sg on <u>Android</u> or <u>Apple</u>.

To use the public buses or MRT in Singapore, you will need to purchase a stored value card (<u>EZ-Link</u> <u>Card</u>) available at all MRT stations and bus interchanges.

#### <u>Private Transportation – Taxi/Rideshare</u>

- I. <u>Standard taxi fares</u> are distance-based, but there are many add-on surcharges based on when you ride, where you hail the cab and whether there are tolls on the route taken. All taxis in Singapore use the meter so there's no haggling involved,
- II. Rideshares are an alternative to taxis if you have a local data plan and access to the apps. You can usually book and pay through the app.Commonly used apps: Grab, Gojek, TADA

#### Others:

#### 1. Currency

Singapore uses **Singapore dollars (SGD)** as its currency. **Major credit cards (Visa and Mastercards)** are accepted at hotels, by most taxis (ask before getting in), and major restaurants. Cashless payment through AliPay and WeChat is also widely accepted. Some hawkers and street merchants will also accept credit card, though cash might be more useful. You can exchange money at the airport. There are ATMs that will dispense SGD in the airport and throughout the island.
